When I think Christmas, my nostalgia kicks in as I remember traveling to Pilchuck Secret Valley to identify and cut our Christmas tree and then sipping (*way too*) *hot* cider as we watched the tree-bailers work; or Frederick & Nelson "Santa Breakfasts" downtown; or heading up to Olympic Manor in Ballard to drive through and see the amazing Christmas lights; or driving over to Spokane to do Christmas with my mom's parents (and often extended family). I remember going to Christmas Eve Mass and thinking "I cannot wait until this is over so we can get back and hang stockings."

Nostalgia in relation to childhood may not be a bad thing; but if I'm honest and reflect back on my childhood (or read my journals) I remember how often bored and restless I was. Nostalgia is a selective memory that may trick us into thinking there really were "good old days" and can keep us from living in the present. I am far less bored and restless now that I am an adult, and also I *usually* do not now think "I cannot wait until Mass is over!" In relation to Christmas, the memories of sneaking into the living room to check out the presents under the tree in the early morning brings that nostalgic feeling and a smile to my face, but the memory doesn't give me joy or peace by itself.

And Jesus conveys that to us in *this* life, not just the life to come.
